Educational Milestone	Economic Benefits & Tax Base Impact	Community & Fiscal Savings
High School Equivalency (HSE) Completion	Average annual wage earnings increase of \$9,000 for GED exam completers, scaling with continuous training.	For every 400,000 adults who earn their HSE, the tax base increases by \$2.5 Billion.
100+ Hours of Active Seat Time	Average wage earnings increase by \$10,000 for every 100 hours of structured seat time.	Dramatically reduces reliance on public support programs, saving the economy \$200 Billion overall.
Incarcerated Learner Services	Equips inmates with foundational literacy, numeracy, and vocational skills prior to release.	43% lower odds of recidivating, breaking generational cycles of crime and incarceration.
