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Eddie Rivera

After a turbulent teenhood, Eddie Rivera found himself incarcerated, but not forgotten. Adult education breathed life into the dreams he had always had, and upon reentry, Eddie began to chase his second chance with everything he had.

Adult Education Benefits

- 49%** of family literacy students reported a stronger home to school connection with their children’s education.
- 90%** of individuals entering the adult ed program with the stated goal of obtaining their high school diploma achieved that goal.
- 45%** of HSE completers go on to higher education with a 90% rate of completion.
- 80%** of adult education students report an increase in their use of digital tools since the pandemic.
- 78%** of adult learners are people of color. Adult education provides equal access.
- 43%** lower odds of recidivating for inmates receiving adult education services.

Impact

- Average wage earnings increase by **\$9,000** for GED exam completers.
- Average wage earnings increase by **\$10,000** for every **100 hours** of seat time.
- For every **400,000** adults who earn their high school diploma, the tax base increases by **\$2.5 billion**, and the economy saves **\$200 billion** in reduced costs for public support programs that assist low literacy adults.**
- Every mother that participates in adult education, **breaks intergenerational cycles of poverty**.
- Research shows that a mother’s reading level is the greatest determinant of a child’s future academic success, outweighing every other factor including poverty.

Adult Education is Underfunded

Adult education receives **\$580** on average per adult learner of federal funding compared to **\$10,000** per pupil for elementary education.

Adult Education Provides Solutions

75.1 million are low-skilled in numeracy

51.4 million are low-skilled in literacy

43 million lack the basic skills to compete in the workforce

30 million lack a high school diploma; yet all colleges and 63% of all U.S. jobs require at least a HS diploma

28 million lack the basic digital skills to operate a computer
